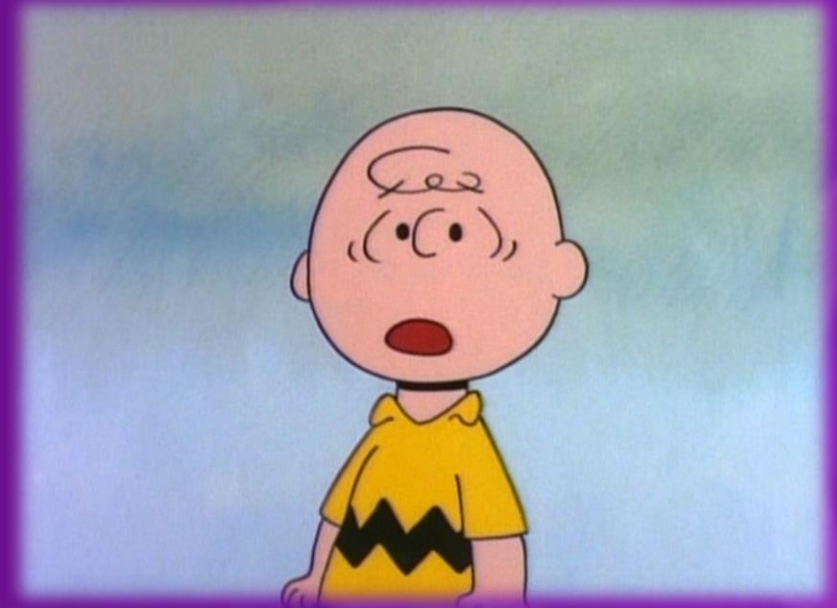


# Modal auxiliaries of possibility



# MODAL MIGHT

- We use *might* and *might not* to talk about possible futures.
  - The earth *might* get hotter
  - *Might* it rain later?
  - I *might not* get an A in English



# MODAL MAY



- We use **may** in a similar manner to **might**. **may** is more formal than **might**.
  - It **may** rain today

- **May**, in questions is usually used to ask for permission.
  - **May** I use your bathroom?

# MODAL MUST

- We use *must* and *mustn't* (*must not*) to talk about rules.
- *Must* is used to talk describe a strong obligation
  - You *must* wear a uniform to school
- *Mustn't* is used for prohibition.
  - You *mustn't* talk during the exam



# HAVE TO and DON'T HAVE TO

- We use *have to* for obligation.
  - I *have to* wear a uniform.



- We use *don't have to* when there is not obligation .
  - I *don't have to* wash the dishes on fridays
